FEND conference

The conference, in Rome this year, is drawing near and our registrar has been exceptionally busy. We have over 500 delegates registered to date, with more to come, and we have an excellent venue which I am sure will provide ideal facilities for us. The programme, with interesting topics and eminent speakers, should promote a stimulating and interactive meeting. There has been a very good response to our call for abstracts, and we look forward to hearing and reading about our members' initiatives in practice.

FEND ENDCUP

Two modules of the FEND ENDCUP programme took place in London in June this year, at Roehampton University. There were 30 participants from all over Europe, including our Eastern European colleagues from Poland, Latvia, Bulgaria, Romania, Hungary and Turkey. All participants evaluated all aspects of the programme very highly, including the content of the programme, the speakers who presented the lectures and workshops, and the excellent information manuals provided. The staff of the University of Roehampton were particularly helpful and ensured the programme ran smoothly from beginning to end. The third research module will take place next year, venue to be decided. The success of this programme is particularly exciting for FEND, in helping us to fulfil our aim of assisting in the development of similar courses in some of the European Countries, especially in Eastern Europe.

We are currently in discussions with a number of universities that have expressed interest in establishing a FEND Professorial Chair in Diabetes Nursing. We look forward to further negotiations, planned during the next few months, and the eventual appointment of a suitable candidate. We will keep you posted on future developments.

The journal continues to be very popular with our members and, due to its success, it has been necessary to appoint a Co-editor to help Sarah Hills our Editor. We are very pleased that Bert Vrijhoef, PhD, agreed to take on this important role, and we look forward to his input and new ideas.
